- Federated States of Micronesia (FSM) (Includes Pohnpei, Kosrae, Chuuk and Yap)
- Territory of Guam
- · State of Hawaii
- Republic of Marshall Islands
- · Republic of Palau

The USDA Forest Service's Pacific Southwest Region and Institute of Pacific Islands Forestry are also members of the PIFC.

MISSION

The mission of the PIFC is to develop well-informed approaches to managing natural resources and forestry issues that address the needs of the forests¹ of Hawai'i and the U.S.-Affiliated Pacific Islands (USAPI).

This approach informs the Council of Western State Foresters (CWSF) and WFLC and ensures that these entities present a unified voice and compelling actions to policymakers, the National Association of State Foresters (NASF), and the Washington Office of the USDA Forest Service (Forest Service), on behalf of the State of Hawai'i, Territories of Guam and American Samoa, Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands, the Federated States of Micronesia, the Republic of the Marshall Islands, and the Republic of Palau with their unique forestry management issues.

ABOUT THE PIFC

The PIFC provides a forum for technology transfer, training, research, learning, and cultural information exchange among USAPI, WFLC, CWSF, NASF, and Forest Service members on topics that concern forests, livelihoods, and environmental impacts in the region.
